College & Career Field Trips



In October and November, we as a community learn to understand the new challenges that manufacturing and healthcare companies have to face now with fewer workers and how that can affect the entire country, which is why Mrs. Turvey uses a partnership with the Middletown, Monroe, and Trenton Chamber of Commerce to allow Monroe students in the Career and College Readiness class to see more jobs firsthand. In October, the students went on manufacturing tours to Magellan Aerospace and Cleveland Cliffs. In early November, students take trips to Atrium Medical Center and Mount Pleasant. Both to help students see in person the way these jobs are. This partnership helps because it allows the students to decide whether they want to go into these fields. When a student decides they do not want to go into these careers, it allows them to use their money, resources, and time to get into what they want. After Covid, all healthcare and manufacturing companies took a significant hit. They need employees, so exposing younger adults and older teenagers to these jobs cannot only help fill some of those positions but it can also help students make decisions. Just this past August there were 795,000 Manufacturing jobs open according to www.nam.org and by 2030 4 million jobs in manufacturing are projected to be needed. Now more than ever digital healthcare positions are required. After Covid telehealth appointments were 38x more used than before. The healthcare industry is also projected to grow 15.1 percent by the end of 2028 which is around 19,406 more open jobs than we currently have in the healthcare system.


Alumni Spotlight: Blake Leonard


